1. Welcome and Moment of Silence

Mayor Foster, Chair, welcomed everyone and opened the meeting at 5:00 p.m. with a moment of silence.

Mayor Foster recognized new members Sara Carter, Amherst Town Manager, and Charlie Watts, Campbell County Board of Supervisors.

2. Approval of Minutes of the November 16, 2017 Meeting

Upon a motion by Bonnie Svrcek, and seconded by Frank Rogers, the minutes of the November 16, 2017 meeting were approved as presented.

3. Auditor Report, Financial Update

Rosalie Majerus introduced Adam Duncan, representing Robinson, Farmer, Cox, who reviewed the FY17 LGC audit. Mr. Duncan reported no findings in the audit.

The motion was made by Waverly Coggsdale, and seconded by Megan Lucas, to accept the audit report. The motion was unanimously approved.

4. FY19 Budget

Rosalie Majerus presented the proposed FY19 budget. She asked for approval of the budget, which includes an increase in health insurance, and a 2% salary merit increase. Some of this is offset by a decrease in VRS.

Bonnie Svrcek stated that she could not support the merit increase, as the City of Lynchburg does not have the resources to provide a salary increase in its budget. She also asked that an RFP be issued for health insurance next year. Rosalie advised that this is planned for next year.

Frank Rogers warned against closely coupling the regional entity and to consider this organization on its own merits and resources.

The motion was made by Sara Carter to endorse the 2% salary increase and health insurance cost for FY19. The motion was seconded by Kenneth Campbell.

Following discussion on approving the full budget, Sara Carter withdrew her motion, and Frank Rogers made a motion to approve the budget as presented, to include a up to a 2% merit increase and the health insurance increase. The motion was seconded by Sara Carter and the motion was unanimously approved.

5. Strategic Planning

1) Kelly Hitchcock presented an update on the strategic planning process. Over the past several years the LGC has been using the Virginia's Region 2000 Partnership plan as the Strategic Plan required for DHCD reporting. Now that the Partnership has been dissolved, an updated LGC Strategic Plan is needed that will guide future program and project activities. This process is important in developing regional priorities,

being able to support a proactive process to be responsive to future programming and to increase the profile of the Local Government Council.

Some of the areas that are being reviewed and updated include:

- Transportation
- CEDS
- Hazard Mitigation
- Water Supply
- Sustainable Communities
- Energy Conservation
- Environmental Justice
- Agriculture

Kelly explained that strategic plans provide guidance for staff and impact funding.

Frank Rogers voiced reluctance to go into another strategic planning process. He questioned whether there could be four or five of the topics presented that the LGC could be emphasizing as strategic objectives going forward for the next twelve or eighteen months.

2) Gary introduced Wayne Strickland, from the Roanoke Valley Alleghany Regional Commission. Mr. Strickland spoke about their experiences with SERDI and the Regional Assessment. He explained that a Strategic Plan can be seen in two ways. It can be something to direct the region moving forward in terms of projects and improvements, or can be internal, as is the Roanoke Regional Commission. It is an organizational strategic plan, concerned with maintaining relevancy in the region. They have employed SERDI twice to help them do that.

Gary Christie advised that the SERDI process would cost up to \$7,500.00 and would take sixty days. We would schedule the process to start in August.

Bruce Johannessen made a motion to move forward with SERDI, with a second by Frank Rogers. The motion was unanimously approved.

6. Proposed Retirement of the Region 2000 Name

This item will be discussed at the April meeting.

7. Office Space Update

Gary Christie reviewed past discussion about relocating office space. The Alliance has offered office space, and Gary went over their offer, including space and cost. After looking at everything involved and having Wiley Wilson help with drawings, the staff recommends thanking the Alliance for their offer, but declining the offer because of the renovation cost and continue to explore other space options.

Gary Case addressed the council, reviewing space available at the Alliance, and cost.

Frank Rogers stated that he would like to see the LGC reduce the square footage and also the rent. He added that he did not see that the LGC, as a PDC, is the intuitive cohabitant of the

LRBA facility. Frank suggested leaving the offer from the LRBA on the table, while continuing to look for other options. Megan Lucas suggested getting bids for the build-out at the Alliance. Frank replied that this could be explored, although his preference is to have a private landlord receive benefit of guaranteed rent in this community. Waverly Coggsdale advised that staff be charged with finding another, less expensive location.

Bonnie Svrcek stated that the Workforce Board would be a more logical fit at the Alliance. Ben Bowman explained that there is still the possibility that the Workforce eventually be located at CVCC.

In consideration of a timeline, Frank Rogers felt that there should be some decision ready to be made at the next meeting.

8. Rural Transportation Planning Work Program FY2019

Scott Smith presented the FY 2019 Rural Transportation Planning Work Program for approval. The amount of funding is \$72,500.00 each year.

A motion was made by Frank Rogers, and seconded by Megan Lucas, to approve the resolution for the FY 2019 Rural Transportation Planning Work Program. The motion was unanimously approved.

Scott presented a budget amendment for DRPT funding in the amount of \$23,361.00, which was rolled over from last year's budget, to use to bring on a consultant to help with a study for a regional van pool.

A motion was made by Sara Carter to approve the budget amendment, and seconded by Mayor Foster. The motion was unanimously approved.

9. Items from Staff

Gary Christie asked to continue the discussion of the Region 2000 name until the April meeting. Staff suggests that we go back to "Central Virginia", and set up a committee to work with Gary and the staff to work on reviewing the charter and the bylaws of the organization. A name change would require asking each jurisdiction for permission to change the charter.

Gary also reported that the final Hazard Mitigation planning grant was approved at the federal level. Kelly Hitchcock will get started on that with Virginia Tech, and jurisdictions will be billed the \$2,500.00 that has been committed.

The Region 2000 Brand and Partnership

In 1989, a group of local business and economic development leaders coined the name "Region 2000" to describe the 2,000 square-mile area of the Lynchburg MSA. A regional economic entity, which ultimately became the Region 2000 Economic Development Council, was formed. By the year 2000, efforts to brand the area as Region 2000 had progressed, and the Central Virginia Planning District Commission changed its three-decade-old name to the Region 2000 Regional Commission. Five years later, the organization changed its name to Virginia's Region 2000 Partnership -- Regional Council *doing business as* the Local Government Council. Other entities also took on the Region 2000 brand, including the Region 2000 Small Business Development Center, Region 2000 Workforce Investment Board, and Region 2000 Technology Council.

In 2005, the Local Government Council began discussions with the Economic Development Council about potentially co-locating offices. This occurred in early 2007, and most of the Region 2000 organizations operated under one "roof" on the twelfth floor of the Bank of the James Building. Efforts to create a brand identity for the partnership were successful, and earned the group kudos and awards from elsewhere in the state and nation. The Region 2000 Partnership consisted of more than a half-dozen organizations, but all fell under the umbrella of the two primary partners: the Economic Development Council and the Local Government Council.

While the Region 2000 brand was recognized at the state level, it struggled to gain understanding and support from local residents. One known business, an all-terrain vehicle dealership, added the moniker to its name, and Bank of the James commercials touted that the bank served the Region 2000 area. Because Region 2000 began as an economic development initiative, organizational staff working with the Economic Development Council likely had little explaining to do about why they were part of Region 2000. However, Local Government Council staff working in the field often had to overcome citizens' assumptions that they were connected to regional economic development efforts instead of local government services.

Even though most constituents assumed that the Region 2000 brand was solely focused on economic development, most were also confused by the name. The majority of individuals with whom Local Government Council field staff interacted assumed that the word related to the year 2000, which is not an unreasonable theory since the name was first born in the late 1980s and the Central Virginia Planning District Commission changed its name to the Region 2000 Regional Commission in the year 2000. Not knowing that the number refers to the approximate number of square miles encapsulated by the Lynchburg MSA, many present-day citizens look at the name as a stale, eighteen-year-old relic of enthusiastic anticipation of the turn of the millennium.

In December 2015, the Region 2000 Economic Development Council and the Greater Lynchburg Chamber of Commerce merged to form the Lynchburg Regional Business Alliance. Soon after, Economic Development Council staff vacated their portion of the twelfth floor of the Bank of the James Building and moved into the former chamber building on Memorial Avenue. In the fall of 2017, the Alliance moved into newly-developed office space on Lucado Place. When the Lynchburg Regional Business Alliance formed, the Region 2000 Technology Council, one of its partner (and subsidiary) organizations also changed its name to the Lynchburg Regional Technology Council. The Region 2000 Small Business Development Center, which was not an official member of the Region 2000 Partnership, has changed its name to simply the "Business Development Centre."

This ended the economic development community's almost thirty-year involvement with the name "Region 2000" (a designation that was developed for and by them), leaving all remaining usage (including the region 2000.org web site) to the Local Government Council and its subsidiaries.

Potential Names for Planning District Commission #11

The abandonment of the Region 2000 brand by the economic development community may create an opportunity for Planning District Commission #11 (currently known as the Region 2000 Local Government Council) to establish (or re-establish) an identity that is independent of the now-disfavored Region 2000 label.

Across Virginia, planning district commission names typically consist of two parts: a geographic descriptor and a functional descriptor or designation. Potential descriptors are listed below, and could be used in any combination:

"Central Virginia" was the designation for the Planning District Commission for thirty years. While three primary Virginia localities (Lynchburg, Charlottesville, and Richmond) often refer to themselves as being in Central Virginia, the state government bestowed the designation on many Lynchburg-area government agencies and facilities in the 1960s and 1970s. Many organizations and businesses currently use the Central Virginia designation, including:

In fact, residents of the Lynchburg area recognize and use the designation "Central Virginia" in ways that were never achieved by the proponents of the Region 2000 brand. While people in the eastern or northern parts of Virginia might easily lump the Lynchburg area into "Southwest Virginia" (which is reinforced by Lynchburg's share in the Roanoke media market), the exact geographic center of Virginia near Mount Rush in Buckingham County is only about five miles outside of the Lynchburg MSA. While Buckingham County is technically a part of the Charlottesville MSA, Charlottesville does not use the Central Virginia designation for government offices and nonprofits to the degree that Lynchburg does.

Other geographic designations may be appropriate to describe the area served by Planning District Commission #11, but each would have to be carefully evaluated against the following factors:

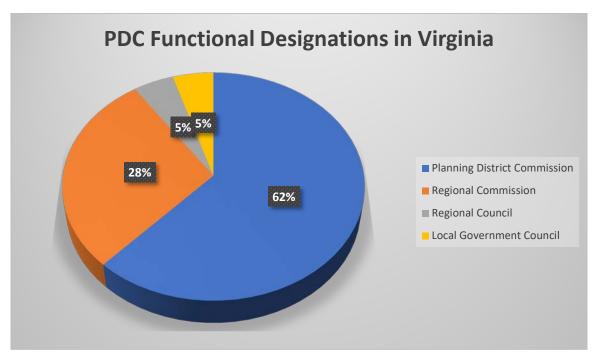
- Appropriate and agreeable inclusiveness of all Lynchburg MSA localities

- Meaningfulness to stakeholders and partners outside the region
- Minimal ambiguity or vagueness
- Clear definition (the meaning behind the name should be easily discernable)

All twenty-one Virginia Planning District Commissions have names that consist of two parts: a geographic descriptor and a functional descriptor or designation.

The Virginia Regional Cooperation Act allows for the following designations for the organization's official name. Other variations must be treated as a "doing business as" or "trading as" name.

Forest Brook Road Corridor Study
